The police department has been involved in the public school system for over 20 years teaching classes and working on prevention. As council was heard prevention methods do evolve and change. The police department is using the current DARE curriculum in some classes but has also added newer programming entitled Second Step. Both programs are directed at helping kids make good choices. Rob is also involved with GCSAPP and works with many of the groups. Classes taught in the Community School this last year are:

- 2ND GRADE – six Second Step lessons were taught to the entire grade level ~75 children
- 4th Grade – Six Second Step classes were taught to the entire grade level ~ 100 children
- 5th Grade – 11 DARE classes were taught to the entire grade level ~80 children
- 7th Grade – 13 Second Step classes were taught to the entire grade level ~ 90 children

The police department has a child safety seat program, ran through the Community Resource Officer, where we provide free or low cost child seats (as available) and

education. Rob is also involved with occupant safety at a state level. In May ten child seat checks/education contacts were done which included two low cost seats provided to parents, courtesy of the Western Regional Occupant Safety Coalition. The WROSC trailer has been loaned to us and has been placed on a lot of the south side of Tomichi, for advertisement/exposure. CSP used the trailer for car seat education at Ana's pledge. Rob attended a CDOT child seat instructor conference in Denver to update on trends, get continuing education and network possible funding and grant opportunities for our community.

Ana's Pledge was held at Lake School on May 3rd. Ninety-seven (97) children participated in the bike safety rodeo. Approximately 22 free bike helmets were distributed during this event, thanks to a Wal-Mart donation. The event was a big success due to involvement from all the City Departments and volunteers that came together to provide their time and expertise.

Jodie and Laurie attended a two week Law Enforcement Supervisory Institute, put on by Colorado Police Officers Training, held in Gunnison at the Fred Field Center.

Meagan Skulley has completed her communications training program and has been scheduled to start covering shifts. Congratulations to Meagan, the training program is not easy.

Melanie Irby left communication to take a position with the school district. Melanie had been with the department for four years. Communications is currently advertising and testing for a replacement.
