Although not reflected in the incidents typically reported, our activity started picking up in August. Calls related to disturbing the peace and disorderly conduct saw larger crowds. We also placed emergency protection holds on 5 individuals who were too intoxicated to care for themselves. In two of the trespass incidents officer's located subjects inside residence who were intoxicated and claimed to not know where they were. The police department also investigated and filed charges in a sexual assault case and an inappropriate sexual contact incident in August. In both cases the suspects were acquainted with the victims but were not involved in any type of relationship.

With the University back officers were busy with freshman orientation and setting up talks for the sports teams and other groups on campus. The goal is to talk with the students and present them information on how to avoid some of the common legal issues students get involved in.

Rob has also been busy setting up class schedules in the community school for all grade levels. He has several lesson models to choose from, so the kids get a different message at all grade levels but with a consistent focus.

The police department would also like to remind all residents to lock their vehicles and residence doors. Many of the incidents dealt with every month are crimes of opportunity. A locked door may prevent someone from getting into your vehicle or entering your home by accident. A locked door may also be all that is needed for the person who is looking for something to steal to move on empty handed.

The police department, through mutual aid, covered six shifts in Crested Butte for the recent “Whatever” event. Crested Butte has arranged to reimburse us for any overtime costs. Officers advised the event was well managed and issues were minimal. We did have some complaints in Gunnison related to the parking of vehicles associated with the event. These were primarily related to the large numbers but we will continue to evaluate and see if something can be put in place to help with future events or situations. There was also a backup of passengers trying to leave the airport on Sunday, as reported in the news. The event organizers worked with the airport and resolved the issue while helping to provide food and drinks for the passengers at the airport. There were a few unhappy passengers but no incidents occurred.

Communications has an opening which is posted on the city web site. Emma McDowell is progressing through the CTO program.
