

As you will see below, criminal activity seems to be holding constant on those areas typically reported. Overall the department is busy with many projects, activities, schedules and planning. Such as; updating police policy to the Lexipol format, updating the training manual for the parking position, working on marijuana criminal ordinances, addressing requests for extend 2 hour parking zone, stop signs and speed limit changes, animal shelter questions, information sharing agreement with WSCU, mutual aid agreement with sheriff’s office, communications is updating their call procedures, scheduling vacations and planning for upcoming events. Bernice Friedman accepted the part time parking enforcement position starting July 6. The position had been vacant since January. Without anyone enforcing the 2 hour limits it was becoming obvious that people were taking advantage of the situation. She will be visiting with business owners and employees as she makes her rounds letting them know that parking enforcement is back. We will have a short period of warning tickets to get everyone back in the routine. The goal of the parking enforcement is to keep the spaces closest to the stores and restaurants, in the business districts, available for customer parking and not employee parking. It is always a balancing act to keep parking within a block or two of the downtown area for employees while keeping convenient space for customers.

Laurie attended the 2015 NENA (Nat’l Emergency Number Assn) Convention in Denver and put in 32 hours volunteering at the convention to help host on behalf of Colorado.

The police officer completed in house training on arrest control. Police officers and NSO also participated in CPR and 1<sup>st</sup> aid recertification in June.

June featured a lot of activities in town that brought many extra visitors like the Colorado Hog Rally, the Block Party, and the Softball tournament. No significant issues were identified beyond increased traffic and a few road closures. July is only slated to get busier so June saw a lot of meetings in preparation.
